HOLY WEEK

Below is a summary of the significance of each day of Holy Week. The three days from Holy Thursday evening until Easter Sunday evening are known as the *Triduum* (a Latin word meaning 'three days'). During these three holy days the Church remembers Jesus' suffering, death and Resurrection. The Easter Vigil and the celebrations of Easter Sunday bring the *Triduum* to a joyful conclusion. The Resurrection of Jesus Christ is such an important feast for Christians worldwide and is celebrated over the fifty days, from Easter to Pentecost.

Holy Thursday (6 April): The feast of the Passover is an important Jewish holiday. During this feast the people remembered the time when Moses, with the help of God, freed the Hebrew people from slavery in Egypt. They did this through a special meal. As a Jew, Jesus followed these customs and traditions. Jesus shared this special meal with his friends, which we call the Last Supper. We too continue this tradition by remembering and celebrating the Last Supper when we attend Mass.



Good Friday (7 April): After the Last Supper, Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray to his heavenly Father. He took Peter, James and John. The Gospels tell us that Jesus experienced distress. It was at this place that Jesus was arrested. He was brought before Pontius Pilate and was condemned to death by crucifixion. He was scourged, ridiculed and had a crown of thorns placed on his head. He was then nailed to a cross. After he died, Jesus was buried in a tomb outside Jerusalem. The crucifix is a sign of love because on it Jesus opened his arms to embrace the world.



Easter Sunday (9 April): Easter is at the heart of our Christian faith. On Easter Sunday we celebrate Jesus' resurrection from the dead. In the Gospels, it was Mary Magdalene to whom Jesus first appeared. She came to realise and understand that Jesus was alive and she rushed to tell the other disciples. As people of the Resurrection, we too bring the good news of Easter to others. This is our challenge!

LEADERSHIP and MANAGEMENT

Revisiting the Parent Code of Conduct

This Code of Conduct is a MACS/School policy designed to state clearly expected behaviours of parents whose children are involved in Catholic education in the Archdiocese of Melbourne. Generally speaking, communication is in line with the Code. Occasionally due to high negative emotions or anger, some conversations can be very challenging. The Code is based on the following principles that everyone:

- has the right to be safe
- has the right to be treated with respect and be valued even in disagreement
- has the right to participate within a secure environment without interference, intimidation, harassment, bullying or discrimination
- is encouraged to be respectful, polite, courteous and considerate of others

I have attached the full copy of the Code with this newsletter and it is also available on the school's website. When engaging with staff at school, we expect all parents to follow the Code guidelines and ensure interactions:

- uphold the school's core beliefs and values
- behave in a manner that does not endanger the health, safety and wellbeing of themselves or others
- abide by all health and safety rules and procedures operating within the school
- respect school staff and accept their authority and direction within the exercise of their duties
- observe all school rules as required
- strictly adhere to the school's policies and procedures as required
- behave with respect, courtesy and consideration for others
- refrain from all forms of bullying and harassment
- refrain from any form of verbal insult or abuse and from any form of physical abuse or intimidation

If communication deviates from these expectations, the meeting will be ended and a meeting will need to be held with the principal.

Unacceptable conduct includes, but is not limited to:

- any form of physical or verbal violence including fighting, assault or threats of violence.
- approaching a child that is not your own with a view to disciplining that child for their behaviour. Such matters are only to be dealt with by school staff.
- approaching other school parents to resolve issues arising between students at school. Such matters should be referred to school staff.
- any form of cyber bullying or cyber abuse that is directed towards the school, staff members, students or parents or any member connected to the school.
- any form of threatening language, gestures or conduct.
- language or conduct which is threatening or likely to offend, harass, bully or unfairly discriminate against any student, employee, contractor, volunteer or other person.
- corresponding or communicating with school staff in a manner which is unreasonable (including via email or apps) in terms of the frequency or volume of communications, or the nature or tone of such communications.
- the use of inappropriate or profane words or gestures or images.

HEALTH ALERTS

If your child has an allergy, please ensure you provide the appropriate action plan signed off by your medical practitioner and provide the school with the medication, i.e. epi-pen or antihistamine.

Life Threatening Allergies Anaphylaxis

The following year levels have children with allergies:

Prep: eggs

Year 1: Cashews, pistachio, eggs, wheat, milk

Year 3: Nuts, seafood, cashews, pecans, hazelnuts, macadamias, walnuts, pistachios, egg

Year 4: Cashews, pistachios, red lentils

Year 5: Eggs, peanuts, hazelnut, walnuts, pecan, nuts, milk.

Year 6: Nuts, pistachios, cashews, egg

Please note: We suggest, regardless of the class your child is in, that you avoid sending your child with peanut butter or Nutella sandwiches or any health bars which contain tree nuts. As expressed in earlier newsletters, if a child comes into contact with the allergen even if it is by a touch on the hand, it can trigger an anaphylactic reaction. Children having a severe anaphylactic reaction will experience difficulty breathing, swelling of the throat, face, lips and tongue, sweating, low blood pressure, abdominal pain, dizziness, fainting and nausea. It might be challenging to make our school completely nut free, however we do make a conscious effort to reduce every possible risk. We need your help and cooperation in this matter.

Please note: if your child is having a birthday and you wish to give something to the class, please ensure it is a **non-food item**.
